We know this is a really challenging time for families as they balance working from home, teaching from home and a mammoth amount of multitasking under the one roof so be kind to yourselves and avoid putting yourself under undue pressure at this time.

At the junior end of the school, senior infants have been working very hard from home. They have been exploring capacity and length in math, keeping up with their reading and writing and of course having lots of fun. They are also learning about mini-beasts which is a great excuse to spend lots of time in the garden.

The class teddy (his name, Johnny Sexton, was chosen by the pupils at the start of the year) has been joining in on some of the work and sending pictures to his classmates. Johnny recently discovered a 'distant relative' and the children have named him Toffee (he gets up to all sorts of mischief, as you can see from the pictures). Senior Infants have read stories together, danced to the birthday boogie to celebrate a birthday and they even had a zoom catch up with everyone. Ms Murphy and Ms Sheil said it was so lovely to see everyone's happy faces.

Meanwhile, green-fingered Ms Morgan is putting some of her free time to good use by pursuing her passion for gardening. The school garden has never looked so good!




Amy, in 2nd class, has been learning her spellings and helping her younger sister, Lara, to search for bugs.

She says that technology comes with its own difficulties, but it's less challenging dealing with it in a sunny garden than when you have 30 children in front of you waiting for it to work! 5^{th} class have a

daily hour of exercise to complete too - some have been enjoying Joe Wicks P.E. lessons, others have been out walking with their dogs. Their teacher however, prefers sea-swimming on the North beach though to clear her head after much more time in front of a computer than she's used to!

Using an online teaching platform, 5th class have been able to share stories, pictures and videos with their teacher and she said it is fabulous to see their big smiles and happy faces - there was the biltong one child was drying out, the flowers another was planting, lambing season on the farm and lots of messages about how it's easier to work when their teacher is standing over them! Their teacher admits that it's a strange way to be teaching and she really misses the interactions with her students but loves when she bumps into a child and their family (obviously at a 2 metre distance!) when out for a walk.
